





What is VTAC?




The **Victorian Tertiary Admissions Centre (VTAC)** is the central point for applications to Victorian universities, TAFEs, and Independent Tertiary Colleges for tertiary courses, scholarships and the Special Entry Access Scheme (SEAS).

VTAC also calculates the Australian Tertiary Admission Rank (ATAR) for Year 12 VCE students.

VTAC is the one stop shop for universities, TAFEs and independent tertiary colleges in Victoria.

Who should apply through VTAC?

Citizenship and residency requirements

You can apply for courses through VTAC if you are:

- an Australian citizen
- an Australian permanent resident
- a New Zealand citizen
- a temporary resident or someone planning to obtain a student visa who is currently studying an Australian Year 12 (in Australia or overseas), for example: VCE, VCAL, HSC, NTCE, QLD Senior Certificate, SACE, TCE, WACE or International Baccalaureate in Australia or New Zealand.

If you meet the citizenship or residency requirements above, you can apply for courses through VTAC. You will need to meet specific entrance requirements before being considered for a course offer.





This is a comprehensive degree with an analytical focus. You'll learn to think conceptually, solve problems analytically and use data to make informed decisions. It's the perfect foundation for a career in business.

You'll start by studying a range of core units to get a sense of where your interests lie. Then you'll begin to build specialist skills, majoring in accounting, actuarial studies, behavioural commerce, business analytics, econometrics, economics, finance, management studies, marketing science, mathematical foundations of econometrics or sustainability and responsible management.



Selection Rank: example

This is Parker.

Parker wasn't sure if she would get into her dream course as she was worried the ATAR she received wouldn't be high enough.

However, she applied for SEAS through VTAC in September, for her rural living location, financial disadvantage and medical condition.

By applying for SEAS, the unis she applied for were able to take into consideration the circumstances out of her control that had made it harder for her to achieve her best during VCE.

This meant that her Selection Rank was increased beyond her ATAR, and she was able to receive an offer from her dream course.





Applying for courses

What you need to apply

Before you create a VTAC account, there are a few things you need:

- USI
 - a Unique Student Identifier is required by the Australian government when applying for tertiary courses. It's easy to register for free at www.usi.gov.au
 - VCAA student number
 - Obtained from your school
- A non school email address
 - Addresses with .edu won't be able to register, make sure you have a non school email address to create a VTAC account

Rights and responsibilities

1. An authorised nominee is assigned to manage the administration of VTAC applications.
2. Should the applicant wish the nominee to have access to the VTAC User Account, it is the responsibility of the applicant to ensure the nominee has the relevant VTAC I.D. and PIN.
3. VTAC will not provide any nominee with the specifics of:
 - the VTAC ID
 - the VTAC PIN
 - personal details
 - sensitive information – i.e. confidential supporting statements
 - the ATAR or scaled study scores
 - the VCE results
 - ARTS/electronic post-secondary results including GPA

Course application payment

- 2024 timely application fee for current year 12 students: \$60
- For a timely application, you need to apply and pay by 30 September at 5pm.
- Late fee \$150 / very late \$195
- Pay using a credit or debit card via PayPal. (A PayPal account is not required).
- Best to make payment at the time of submitting an application so you don't forget!





Access & Equity

SEAS & Scholarships

As part of your VTAC application, you'll have the opportunity to apply for both SEAS and Scholarships:

SEAS

Recognising factors that may have prevented you from demonstrating your full potential for success

Scholarships

Recognising where you might need support as you go through your tertiary study

SEAS and Scholarship applications are free to submit within your VTAC account.

Scholarships

- VTAC collects scholarship applications for many institutions.
- Scholarships are not just for academic performance.
- Many equity scholarships have similar documentation requirements to SEAS.
- List of scholarships available on the VTAC website, including some scholarships which require their own separate application.

Access and Equity scholarships are awarded for reasons such as:

- financial disadvantage
- being the first in your immediate family to attend university
- being an Indigenous Australian
- being a refugee or asylum seeker
- having to relocate to attend tertiary study
- intending to live on campus
- having been in formal out-of-home care
- having a disability or medical condition that affects your education
- community service and leadership

All details provided in your application will be considered for Scholarship opportunities.



Special Entrance Access Scheme (SEAS)

- SEAS provides consideration for your situation or circumstances that have impacted your studies.
- One application for all your course preferences for courses that participate.
- SEAS does not exempt you from meeting course requirements. You must consider prerequisites and complete any other requirements.
- Applying for SEAS will never disadvantage you! If you are eligible, it can only improve your ranking for selection.

Examples for applying

- Mental health diagnosis
- Financial hardship
- Discrimination and bullying
- Excess family responsibilities
- Illness or injury
- Non English speaking background
- Regional or remote location
- Death of immediate family member or friend

SEAS categories and requirements

Category 1: Personal information and location

- Covers demographic circumstances such as living or school location, age and gender.
- No evidence required, simply tick yes for category 1 application and submit your application.

Category 2: Financial disadvantage

- Applies to applicants whose daily life is affected by financial disadvantage.
- Evidence required - Centrelink evidence or Impact statement and Statement of Support.

Category 3: Disability or medical condition

- Educational disadvantage due to disability or medical conditions, including mental health conditions.
- Impact statement and Statement of Support required.

Category 4: Difficult circumstances

- Applicants prevented from reaching educational potential due to family or other life circumstances.
- Impact statement and Statement of Support required*

*some high impact circumstances require other evidence.

SEAS application requirements: Financial disadvantage

If the applicant receives Centrelink benefits in their name

Provide Customer Access Number (CAN) or Customer Reference Number (CRN) in their application.

If the applicant's parent/guardians receive Centrelink benefits in their name

Provide a copy of parent/guardian's Centrelink Statement of Benefit or Family Tax Benefit statement that is no older than three months, with relationship to applicant indicated.

If no Centrelink benefits are received

Impact statement

Questions about how daily life has been impacted by financial disadvantage.

Statement of Support

A Statement of Support must:

- Explain impact on applicant's daily life

SEAS application requirements: Disability or medical condition

When applying, there are two sections you are required to submit. They are:

Impact statement

A statement written in your own words about to condition and how your education has been impacted by your health

Make sure focus is on the impact on your education

Reminder: start making appointments with your health practitioner early to ensure they can provide a Statement of Support.

Statement of Support

You **must** provide a statement of support **from a health practitioner**.

Health practitioners include, but are not limited to, GPs, physiotherapists, psychologists and counsellors in the field of health.

A Statements of Support must:

- Confirm diagnosis/condition and duration
- Explain impact on applicant's education

SEAS application requirements: Difficult circumstances

When applying, there are two sections you are required to submit. They are:

Impact statement

A statement written in your own words about how your education has been impacted by your circumstances
Make sure focus is on the impact on your education

Statement of Support

You **must** provide a statement of support from a responsible adult.
A Statement of Support must:

- Confirm circumstance
- Explain impact on applicant's education

Some circumstances such as those relating to refugee or asylum seeker status, homelessness, formal out of home care, sexual assault, family violence or natural disasters may not require impact statements and/or statements of support. Please see VTAC website for more information.

Providing a Statement of Support

A Statement of Support is required for some SEAS and Scholarship applications. A Statement of Support must be written by a responsible adult.

A responsible adult:

- Must be over 21 years of age
- Must not be related to the applicant
- Must not live with the applicant
- Must have known the applicant for at least 12 months or for the duration of the circumstance/condition

A statement of support should focus on the impact the circumstance or condition has had on your education.



FACT SHEET

PROVIDING A STATEMENT OF SUPPORT

If you are an applicant who needs to supply a statement of support for their SEAS or scholarship application, give this fact sheet to the responsible person you have chosen to write you a statement of support so they understand what is required of them.

What is SEAS?
The person who gave you this sheet is applying for special consideration under the Special Entry Access Scheme (SEAS) and/or scholarships as part of their application for tertiary study through VTAC (the Victorian Tertiary Admissions Centre). SEAS allows an applicant to receive special admissions when applying for courses to cover circumstances, events or conditions in their personal context that have negatively affected their education or, in the case of financial disadvantage, their daily life. Scholarships are also available for similar circumstances.

How do I provide my statement?
You can provide your statement one of two ways:

Online:
Give the applicant your email address. From their VTAC account, they can generate a one-time login which will be sent to you by email. You can then type your statement of support directly into the application.

Scanned document:
Type your statement of support onto the VTAC template supplied to the applicant, and then supply it to VTAC by uploading a scanned copy. If you are unable to access the VTAC template, you can provide a statement on your personal letterhead. Please include the circumstances and condition or circumstance, duration and impact on education or, in the case of financial disadvantage, their daily life. Scholarships are also available for similar circumstances.

What is my statement needed?
For some categories of SEAS and some scholarships, a statement of support is needed to corroborate the information supplied by the applicant. The form sent to you by the applicant may indicate that it is for use with both SEAS and scholarships applications.

Am I the right person to provide a statement of support?
A statement of support must be from a relevant responsible person. This means someone who:
 Is 21 years of age or older
 Has known the applicant for at least 12 months or for the entire duration of the circumstances, whichever is shorter
 Is not related to the applicant by birth, marriage, or de facto relationship, and
 Does not live with the applicant.

What should I include in my statement?
Be as concise as possible about the circumstances or condition and focus primarily on the impact on the applicant's education or, in the case of financial disadvantage, their daily life. Include a timeline and be as specific as possible about the impact. The applicant has already written their own impact statement, and you may wish to view this before writing your statement of support.

Do not include an overly detailed description of the circumstances or description - the limit for this section is 500 characters. Focus instead on the educational impact. Do not supply lengthy medical reports, photographs, x-rays, or other technical information.

Privacy and confidentiality
All sensitive information is collected and used in accordance with VTAC's Privacy Policy. A statement of support that you supply online will not be automatically visible to the applicant, however may be released to them on request if required by law, or under your organisation's privacy policy.

SEAS guaranteed document review

If you submit any SEAS and Scholarship supporting document by **20 September 2024**, then VTAC will review these documents.

- Any uploaded documents will be verified by VTAC staff and “approved” or “rejected” in advance of the SEAS closing date.
- Any CRNs provided to VTAC which do not return benefit information will be identified, and applicants notified.
- Documents can still be submitted until the 11 October closing date, but these may not be reviewed by VTAC staff until after the closing date (so there is no opportunity to resubmit if a document is illegible etc.)



Preferences

Preferences & Offers

Important -

- List preferences in the order you actually want the courses.
- You will receive a maximum of one offer per round, from the highest preference willing to make an offer.
- You won't find out about any lower preference courses.
- Early-closing courses can't be re-added to the preferences list after their closing date
- Use the qualification level filter or check the description to ensure students are applying for the correct course level.

- 1 Bachelor of Physiotherapy
- 2 Bachelor of Health Sciences
- 3 Bachelor of Biomedical Sciences
- 4 Diploma of Sciences
- 5 Diploma of Health
- 6 Diploma of Allied Health

You can re-order, add or remove courses during the change of preference period

Accepting an offer

You will receive enrolment instructions from the institution, and if you do not accept the offer in the required timeframe, the offer will lapse and you will be unable to accept it later.

It's recommended to always accept an offer - this won't affect your chances of an offer in a later round as long as you have higher preferences on your list.

If you don't get your top preference in the first round of offers:

Accept the offered course so you have it as an option, and withdraw if you receive a preferred course in a later round.

If you get your first preference but want an offer from a lower preference:

Accept the offered course and move it down your preference list during change of preference to be eligible for any courses you put above it in your list.

Changing your preferences

- After applying, you can change your course preferences free-of-charge as many times as you like while Change of Preference is open
- After receiving your ATAR, there will be a short time to change preferences before the December offer round.
- Preferences can be changed again between offer rounds.
- Help will be available from your school, the tertiary institutions and VTAC.
- **It's important to get your preferences correct in time for the December round to maximise your chance of getting into the courses you want!**
